ANNOUNCEMENTS SENIOR CHECK-INS

FINANCIAL AID FOR COLLEGE

There are four types of financial aid available for postsecondary education, which fall into two categories. There is gift aid (scholarships and need-based grants) and there is self-help aid (loans & financing and student employment). For the most part, need-based grants, loans & financing, and student employment are all determined and awarded based on the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA). This free application awards any all federal and state funding within those three categories to students for higher education. The last type of aid, scholarships, are discussed in the next section.



HOW DO I COMPLETE THE FAFSA?

Step one of completing the FAFSA is to create an *FSA ID*, which is a unique ID that confirms your identity when you access and electronically sign financial aid documents. Both the student and one parent need an FSA ID. To create an FSA ID, go to: <u>https://fsaid.ed.gov/npas/index.htm.</u> Use this *FSA ID worksheet* to assist you in creating your FSA ID.

Step two of completing the FAFSA is by going to <u>https://studentaid.ed.gov/sa/fafsa</u>, logging in with your FSA ID and completing the application. The application typically takes around 45 minutes to complete and using the IRS Data Retrieval Tool is highly recommended.

The FAFSA can be started, saved, and completed at a later time as well. If you have questions or need assistance, you are encouraged to contact the financial aid office of any of the schools in which the student is applying. Up to 10 schools can be listed on the FAFSA, so a student does not need to have confirmed admission to complete the application.

WHAT HAPPENS AFTER THE FAFSA IS SUBMITTED?

After you submit the FAFSA you will receive a *Student Aid Report (SAR)* to the email you provided on the application. The SAR is just a summary of the information you provided and a chance to make sure no changes need to be made to your application.



The SAR is then shared with any college or university the student listed on their FAFSA.

The student will then receive **financial aid award letters** from each school they applied to and listed on their FAFSA. This award letter will list the amount of grants, loans, work study, and institutional aid you could receive at their school based on their cost of attendance and your *expected family contribution* calculated from your FAFSA. It is smart to wait for all of your award letters to compare costs and see what the net cost for each school is before making a

final decision on where to attend.

MINNESOTA DREAM ACT

In Minnesota, if a student is undocumented, they are eligible to complete the **MN Dream Act application** which will provide them with in-state tuition costs, state grants, and other benefits. Please note, if you are a student with an undocumented parent but you are a citizen, you are eligible to still complete the FAFSA. For more information, go to: <u>The MN Office of Higher Ed. SCHOLARSHIPS

WHERE TO FIND SCHOLARSHIPS

Scholarships are the fourth and final type of financial aid and the only one that doesn't run through the FAFSA. Scholarships are a great way to help pay for college. There is an abundance of money available, but there is also a lot of hard work that goes into applying for scholarships. So, where should you look to find them?

- 1. The more local a scholarship, the more likely the chance (typically) of receiving an award. So, think local first!
 - ✓ IGH B.E.S.T. Foundation (application information will be released at the end of February- don't miss this one!!)
 - ✓ Church or other religious affiliations
 - ✓ Workplace (yours, parents)
 - ✓ Community businesses (restaurants, banks)
 - ✓ Anything else you are involved in- it never hurts to ask if they offer a scholarship!
- 2. It's also extremely smart to check the financial aid websites of each of the colleges you are applying.
 - ✓ Most schools will consider students for merit or academic based scholarships as a part of the admission process.
 - Many schools will have additional scholarships available through a separate application process. Typically, admitted students
 will be invited to apply for these additional scholarships.
 - It's best to understand the process of each school and be aware of the different deadlines, so be sure to look for these additional opportunities!
- 3. The last category is national scholarships. This is where you use a scholarship search engine to get matched with scholarship opportunities. These are a good way to go because they offer legitimate scholarships and an easy way to stay organized. There are a wide range of sites to use; the ones listed below are some of my favorite, go-to sites.

Note: most of the sites listed below also offer apps. This makes it even easier to search, organize, and apply for scholarships. Best tip- if you are planning to use any of these search engines- **create a separate email address just for scholarships**. This will keep you organized with everything going to one spot and you won't get flooded with unwanted marketing in your regular email.

4. Every month, I put together this newsletter. It typically includes scholarships from multiple categories above. I try to keep them more local or regional as possible but anything that has been sent my way or brought to my attention is included. It will always be posted on the Schoology Grade 12 course, posted on the Simley College & Career website, and emailed out to those who subscribe to receive the Simley announcements. When we are in-person, hard copies are available in the Student Center.

BEST SCHOLARSHIP TIPS AND STRATEGIES

- Create a separate email address specifically for scholarships so that your primary email isn't flooded.
- Read the directions. Follow the directions.
- It's a numbers game- be strategic with where you are spending your time. Apply more to win more.
- You CANNOT win if you don't apply.
- It gets easier after the first 6 applications.
- Be open, honest, and yourself! Make it personal.
- Don't throw out small scholarships- they add up!
- Tailor your application to meet the sponsor's goals

- Create a resume/activity list so that you don't have to recreate it each time.
- Reuse your essays! If it is the same topic or similar question, be efficient and reuse essays.
- Be diligent and set aside time to specifically work on scholarships.
- The more local you can stay, the better.
- If a scholarship looks like a lot of work, consider applying, as typically these have less competition.
- NEVER pay to be considered for a scholarship.
